Five Simple-Fun Drama Speaking Activities, you'll eager to use in your English classes.

1-Greetings:

Ask students to act greeting each in different way. Provide each pair of students with a specific situation in which their gestures, intonation, eye contact and body language should be relevant to the given situation such as:

- Greet your friend like someone you don't trust
- Greet your friend like you hate
- > Greet your friend like someone you haven't seen for a long time.
- ➢ Greet your friend like a little baby.
- someone you are secretly in love with

LEVELS: all, except total beginners

2-Students-Channel

The teacher needs to use a remote control in this activity. Divide the class into groups. Ask each group to choose a channel or a television show such as an action movie, a talk show, news, a sportscast ... Point the remote at one group pretending to turn on a channel. The group must act the show they represent. After a while, change the channel by pointing to a different group. Then, the first group stops, the second starts. Encourage the groups to be creative so you can watch their performance for a longer time. On another session, you can give the remote control to a student to change the channels.

LEVELS: pre-intermediate and up

3-Alphabet Dialogue

In this activity the students, as a class or in groups, are asked to perform a long dialogue. The first student starts the dialogue with a given letter (it can be chosen by the students) for example 'R'. The second one, continues the dialogue with the next letter after 'R' which is 'S'. The next student must perform the third line of the dialogue which should start with 'T', and so on, until all letters have been covered. After 'Y' comes 'A'. Students that use the wrong letter leave the game. The next student continues the dialogue.

See below an example of a relevant dialogue:

A- Anyway	I- I'd say	S – So
B- but	J- Just a minute	T – Talking about
C- come on, think about it	L- Let me see,	U – Ummm
D- doesn't that mean?	M – Mmmmm	V – Very interesting, but
E- Emm	N – Now, as I was saying	$W - Well \dots$

LEVELS : intermediate and up		

4-The Good, the Bad and the Ugly Advice:

First select three students who need stand in front of the other students. The class give their problems for which they need advice. Each of the three students gives a different kind of advice: good, bad, and very bad (ugly) advice. They can change their roles si they have chance to provide different kinds of advice.

If the 'bad advice' is really bad, then the 'ugly advice' should be worse. This activity is effective for practising modals of advice (should, ought to, must).

LEVELS: pre-intermediate and up

5-The Fortune Teller with Two Heads:

Select two students to be the fortune teller. They should act as one person with two heads. The class can ask them questions about the future. The catch is that the fortune teller must answer the question one word at a time per student. So the answer will be something like this:

- Student A You
- Student B Will
- Student A Meet

- Student B A
- Student A Beautiful
- ➢ Student B Frog......

This is quite challenging because the fortune teller cannot know what each is going to say. This is very good for practising future structures, such as *will* or *be going to*.
